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Cdc Guidelines For Flu Shots

You should get a flu vaccine before flu viruses begin spreading in your community, since it takes about two weeks after vaccination for antibodies to develop in the body and provide protection against flu. Make plans to get vaccinated early in fall, before flu season begins. CDC recommends that people get a flu vaccine by the end of October.

Who Needs a Flu Vaccine and When | CDC

Routine annual influenza vaccination is recommended for all persons aged ≥6 months who do not have contraindications. For each recipient, a licensed and age-appropriate vaccine should be used. Inactivated influenza vaccines (IIVs), recombinant influenza vaccine (RIV4), and live attenuated influenza vaccine (LAIV4) are expected to be available.

It expects this season's flu vaccines to include inactivated, recombinant and live attenuated vaccines, including two new vaccines expected to produce a better immune response in people aged 65 years and older.

Flu Shots: The Latest Recommendations Experts recommended that everyone who is at least six months old get a flu vaccine each year as soon as they can and before flu season begins. One change for 2015-16 is that there is no preference for live attenuated influenza vaccine over inactivated influenza vaccine when either is available.

Latest CDC Flu Shot Recommendations and Guidelines

During the current flu season, CDC recommends annual influenza vaccination for everyone 6 months and older with any licensed, age-appropriate flu vaccine. Injectable influenza vaccine (IIV) is given as an injection (with a needle) and is approved for use in people 6 months and older.

CDC recommends everyone 6 months of age and older get vaccinated every flu season. Children 6 months through 8 years of age may need 2 doses during a single flu season. Everyone else needs

only 1 dose each flu season.
